Price/Loyles Items on Display in Your Museum

The Col. James Price/Loyles home at 718 Spring Street, Weston, MO, was purchased in 1864 by Theodore F. Warner for his sister, Russella E. Warner and her husband, Col. James A. Price.

Russella and Theodore were the children of Minerva Boone Warner who was granddaughter of Daniel Boone. Russella's husband was a second cousin of Robert E. Lee. Eventually there would be five generations of this family to live in the house.


Following the 1991 death of Forestyne Loyles, the last of the family members, the home was sold to the Missouri Dept. of Natural Resources and all of the contents of the home removed from Weston.

The home sat empty and uncared for, for a number of years, until a group of interested Weston citizens finally motivated the DNR to sell the home. Mr. and Mrs. Terry McKenzie, of Kansas City, are the

present owners of the Price/Loyles home and they have lovingly restored it and beautified the lawns.

The contents of the home eventually found a home at the Historic Boone Home and Heritage Center in Defiance, MO, which is owned and operated by Lindenwood University. There one finds not only the Boone Home, but a "village" of a dozen 19th century buildings moved from other sites within a fifty mile radius and includes a chapel and a store. Dr. David Knotts, Ph.D., Professor of American Studies, oversees this heritage center.

It is thanks to Dr. Knotts and several students from Lindenwood University that work on cataloging the items has begun. It is also due to his generosity and belief in helping fellow museums that a number of the artifacts have been loaned to the Weston Historical Museum, coming back home for a time, and are currently on display there.

Among the items are some of the china and silver used in the home through the five generations of Daniel Boone descendants. One can also see a bible that belonged to Col. James Price; a sword and scabbard that belonged to Price's son, Benjamin, and the uniform he wore as a member of the Knights of Pythias.

The Weston Historical Museum is grateful to Dr. David Knotts and his group of students for their help in bringing these items back to Weston for a period of time.

Our Readers Continue To Help Us Out

Joe Pepper was among those who called to help identify Dixie Gabbert as one of the children in our Mystery Corner of the last issue.

He went on to tell us about the coin mentioned in the "Bertha's Morgue" column. It was an old Masonic coin from Chapter #4 of the Royal Arch Masons which no longer exists in Weston. Among other things learned from Mr. Pepper is that the words "One Penny" is part of a ritual to remind the member that it is imperative to help those who are less fortunate. The tools depicted are those that a mason would have used.

Joe also mentioned that in the "Do You Know" column Mr. O. G. Watson may have helped build the retention wall, but Joe remembers, fairly specifically, that a Mr. Guyles was the main builder of the wall.

Justin Hill has recently donated a book entitled *Memorial Addresses on the Life and Character of James N. Burnes*, February 23, 1889. The book has been cataloged and added to the Burnes family file.

James N. Burnes came to Weston with his parents, attended grade school here and later moved to St. Joseph with the family. James returned to Weston to finish his schooling, attended Harvard and later became a member of the Missouri Congress from this district. After many years as a representative, he died in office in Jefferson City in February of 1889.

The Burnes family lived where Mr. and Mrs. L.R. Vaughn now live, on the south end of Washington Street.

Just this past winter, Sandy was honored with Emeritus status for all her work at the Museum.

Sandy is survived by a son, a daughter, two grandchildren, one brother and two sisters.

A "Celebration of Life" was held May 4th at Vaughn Funeral Chapel. In lieu of flowers, memorials were requested for the Museum.

Bits and Pieces from Bertha's Morgue

"The new service station in town is called the F & W and replaces the one run by George Steele in the old Renz Livery building. It is run by Fluharty and Waterman." This comes from an issue of *The Weston Chronicle* dated July 5, 1928.

Girl Scout news came in March 1964 from *The Weston Chronicle*:

"On March 6, the Brownie Scouts met in their regular meeting place for investiture ceremonies. Mrs. Robert Kottman and Mrs. Donald McAdow conducted the ceremonies. Following the services the Brownies served punch and cookies to the parents attending.

"Brownie Scouts are Lana Sue Taulbee, Diane Kottman, Rhonda Kottman, Anita Hall, Cathy Searcy, Cindy Schaback, Debra Ann Graves, Barbara Bless, Sandra Burns, Linda Caldwell, Penny Calvert, Jo Leea Collison, Karen Webb and Margaret Ann Spratt.

"Ruth and Leann Anderson will receive their Brownie pins next week."

From an issue of the local newspaper dated April 23, 1965, we read:

"The Girl Scout House on Washington Street is 'sporting' a new sign. It has a white back ground with the Girl Scout Trefoil in green, outlined in gold.

"It was made and donated to the girls by Sp/5 Roger Larsen."

From the newspaper dated June 12, 1964 we read: "Miss Diza Pepper, graduate of West Platte High school, received her B.S. in Business Administration and her major is Marketing.

"Diza is a member of the Scholastic Honorary fraternity, Sigma Epsilon Sigma; the Professional Sorority Phi Chi Theta, which is a national organization for women in business; and of the social sorority, Kappa Kappa Gamma where she served as Treasurer for the group.

"She has accepted a position as a Management Trainee with Woolf Brothers of Kansas City."

It was noted, in May of 1967, that:

"Gary Anderson, a graduate of West Platte High School, has completed two tours of duty aboard the aircraft carrier The Kitty Hawk."

New Industry in Town Plans Open House

Article taken from the August16, 1963 issue of "The Weston Chronicle".

Weston's newest industry, mixing of fertilizers for local distribution, bids hello to visitors from the entire agricultural area tomorrow at the plant of the Sur-Gro company, between the two (tobacco) warehouse (on Main). Simultaneously with the opening of the plant, an Open House will be held for the area, with refreshments, personally conducted tours, and welcome from the official of the company. Many interesting displays will be shown; there will be a free drawing with prizes for all ages.

"The whole program of the Sur-Gro company is based on soil tests. No one fertilizer or combination of fertilizers will meet the requirements of all farms," said Foulke to a Chronicle reporter yesterday. "We already have a record on from five to six thousand soil tests in the area we serve. We do not make the tests they are made by the University of Missouri Agriculture College. We mix and supply the needs of the soil as indicated by the tests when they are returned. We keep a copy and record of the ingredients, the proportions and the results. The farmer receives a copy of the College's findings and the Extension office of the county has a copy."

All the operations at the Sur-Gro plant are automatic from unloading the component parts of the different mixes as they arrive on the siding, to the measuring and mixing of the ingredients, to the loading of the trucks.

"The Weston Chronicle", August 23, 1963

"Friday evening, a pre-view of the plant was held for all the business people of Weston, to whom invitations had been mailed. Almost every business house and professional office in Weston was represented in the gathering. Several large arrangements of flowers were seen in the offices, the gifts of local firms.

"Only two watermelons were left out of a single ton and the town was depleted of buns and most of the soda pop before the evening was finished. By five o'clock practically everything was gone but the friendly spirit which prompted such an attendance. According to Manager M.C. Brill, the hopper had almost been emptied of practically a capacity load of fertilizers."

From Our Members . . .

Beverly McConnell called us to tell us that her husband, Charles, remembers that Al Turner had been a night watchman in Weston. Though he was not certain of the dates of Mr. Turner's service, he is certain that he was a lawman here. Further evidence has come to light that says Charles is correct. However, no one seems to know the dates. Can anyone help us?



Beverly later recalled there being a Stamper (Elmer?) served as a marshal or night watchman in the 1950's.

Harlen Carter, pictured above, had the distinction of being the last City Marshal and the first Police Chief of Weston, when the change was made in 1972.

His daughter, Cynthia Dusenberry, sent us this photograph for our files.

We have also found a small item from the local newspaper dated February 14, 1908 that reads: "The city council, at its regular meeting last Monday appointed A.A. Williams as city night watchman to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of B.H. South. M.R. Searcy is also retained as a night watchman."

So, it would seem that at different times Weston was blessed with more than one night watchman at the same time. Perhaps they served different shifts or different days.

In our list of Weston lawmen, neither Williams, South, Searcy nor Turner shows up. If anyone knows of others and/or has photos of these gentlemen, please give us a call, a note or stop by the museum.


