# Truman Library Tour a Success


Fifty travelers were greeted with a special aperitif, a fruity punch recipe from Bess Truman's collection, when they boarded a bus August 27th for the long-anticipated visit to The Harry S Truman Presidential Library and Museum in Independence. The event was sponsored by the Weston Historical Museum.

They were also given "goodie bags" of donated items from McCormick Distillery, Bank of Weston and the Shafer & Welch Law Office. Included were a memento and pamphlet from the Truman Library, and a souvenir booklet written and printed by our own Judy Juergens.

Greeted by the Library's Curator, Clay Bauske of Weston, the group had time to wander through some of the many exhibits and displays in the library/museum before visiting the gift shop. They were then taken on a tour through the current exhibit, "Steamboats to Steam Engines: George Caleb Bingham's Missouri, 1819-1879" which featured many items borrowed from our Museum in April.

... in 1945, the minister for the First Baptist Church of Weston was Claude E. Thompson? Rev. Jesse M. Kauffman was pastor of the Christian Church, Rev. E.S. Havighurst was pastor for the Methodist Church and Rev. Charles Miller was the priest at Holy Trinity Catholic Church in that same year.

ery shop in St. Louis? He opened it on December 5th of that year, capitalizing on the household failing of never having any bread for dinner. By 1815 there were three more bakeries in St. Louis and in 1859, Kansas City advertised "something new," a Machine Cracker bakery. The following were stock articles: Soda Crackers, Boston Crackers, Picnic Crackers, Oyster Crackers, Pilot and Ship Crackers, Butter Crackers, Graham Crackers, Water Crackers, and Milk and Wine Biscuits.

. . . Miss Julia Traver was a teacher in the Weston Public School in 1917? She was the daughter of Capt. and Mrs. Robert N. Traver and following her stint as a teacher here, Miss Julia became a well-known newspaperwoman on the staff of the Rochester (N.Y.) Post-Express. Her father was for many years a well-known Missouri newspaperman.



Following the viewing of the exhibit, group members enjoyed a "happy hour" and then a catered buffet-style dinner in the atrium of the building.


A special treat for the group was an insider's tour, which took us into the working area and storage rooms of the museum with Mr. Bauske doing the honors.


The group arrived back in Weston at 10:00 p.m. with great memories of a fun-filled, once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

Executive Board member Zim Hull has been busy with member Chuck Sebus getting a new security camera and monitor in service. Our older system more or less "gave up the ghost."


